
#### **Inspiration Point**

Years ago, when I was a child about six years of age, my parents bought my older brother and I military outfits. His was of a soldier and mine was of a sailor. The Second World War was going on, and it was a patriotic thing. Well, it made an impression on us, as later he would go into the Army and I went into the Navy. I liked the Navy so much that I stayed for twenty-one years to retire from there.

Well, years later, during my oldest son's younger years, we had a picture hanging on the living room wall. It was a harvest scene from a valley somewhere in the Smoky Mountains. In the picture, on the left side stood an old, weather beaten house, and beside that was a fence with farm animals inside. In the right side of the picture was a cornfield with shocks of corn standing all tied up. In that field scattered all around were large orange pumpkins, and a farmer with a horse and wagon was out there harvesting the pumpkins. While it was a homey type of picture, it was very cheap and not very durable. Unknown to me, that picture made a very large impression upon my son. Later in his life, following the completion of his education, he moved to Washington DC to live and work. Once settled, he went down to Luray, VA, in the Shenandoah Valley and purchased a second home. The setting and the view were similar to that in the old picture. Then he came to me and asked if he could have that old picture. Unfortunately, it had not survived the many moves we had made, and had been destroyed and discarded.

Looking Back, While Looking Forward

The other day I was looking over some old letters that had been written to me during my second year in ministry. I was truly blessed after re-reading those letters, most of which hadn't seen the light of day since they were written 15 years ago.

It is nice to go through old letters and mementos and see how different folks have blessed you, and how you have blessed them by sharing your life with them.

When I think about the early church, I realize how important the letters contained in our Bible were to early believers. They needed encouragement and

instruction in the face of tough times such as slavery, persecution (to the point of death), and a pagan culture that wasn't friendly to Christian ideas. I think of the words found in the book of Deuteronomy that read,

# "Serve only the Lord your God and fear him alone. Obey his commands, listen to his voice, and cling to him." (Deut. 13:4 NLT)

This world can so easily get us distracted and overcome with fear or uncertainty in our personal lives as well as our church lives, that we end up just sort of shutting down and become complacent. Individually, and as a church; we need to re-claim Moses' words in Deuteronomy and trust God to lead us to where we need to go.

Imagine greeting your friends and family with something just a little more than the standard glass of orange juice on Thanksgiving morning! Wouldn't that be so much fun?

We often think of punch recipes when we are giving a shower for a bride or a mom-to-be, or maybe for a party around the holidays. This month, though, we would like to shift your thinking about the way we serve punch and when we normally think to serve it. Most would agree that punch is a special event type of beverage...however, special events happen each and every day; especially days that find our friends and family gathered around our table.

What would be nicer than beginning your Thanksgiving Day with a festive punch? Just think of having a pitcher of "Autumn Harvest Punch" to greet your guests as they begin their day with you. Or, just think of having a glass to sip on as you prepare your Thanksgiving meal for later in the day.

Either way, we think that this recipe will add an air of celebration to your day as you take the time to remember your blessings and the One who has blessed you so!

#### Autumn Harvest Punch

64 ounces of apple juice

12 ounce frozen orange juice concentrate

16 ounces of 100% cranberry juice

8 ounces of pear nectar (or white grape juice)

A sliced apple, orange, and/or pear, along with a handful of fresh cranberries for decoration Optional: Add some ginger ale or lemon lime soda for a little fizz

Pour the apple juice, orange juice concentrate, cranberry juice, and pear nectar or white grape juice into a large bowl or pitcher. Stir to combine. Add fruit slices, if using. Add soda to each serving, as desired. Enjoy...and Happy Thanksgiving!!!

For the month of November, we would like to recommend Max Lucado's newest book, <u>How</u> <u>Happiness Happens</u>.

Many of you are familiar with Max Lucado and his books but for those of you who might not be...Max Lucado is America's bestselling inspirational author with over 140 million books in print. He entered the ministry in 1978 and has served churches in Miami, and San Antonio, as well as Brazil. He is currently serving as Teaching Minister of Oak Hills Church in San Antonio.

Worldwide, people are professing that happiness is their most cherished goal. The marketers of today's society understand this goal. They suggest that to attain this happiness we should eat at this restaurant, drive this car, and wear these clothes. To so many, happiness depends on what you can mount on your

trophy wall, deposit in your bank account, experience in your bedroom, or serve at your dining table. We are forced into thinking that happiness will happen when we lose the weight, get the date, find the mate, or discover our fate! This definition of happiness is wide. But, for all of its promise, it turns out to be a fragile joy...here one day, and gone tomorrow ... a victim of the comparison game, our own disappointments, or unmet expectations.

What if there is a different, unexpected path to happiness? What if it doesn't require a credit card, a monthly mortgage, or a stroke of fortune? What if age, looks, and ethnicity aren't even factors at all? What if the road to JOY is less about "getting" and more about "giving"?

# We Celebrate our Veterans!!!



We would like to wish all of our Veterans a very Happy Veterans Day as we celebrate your service and offer our thanks for all that you have sacrificed on behalf of our country. We encourage each family member here at Pleasant Grove to thank the Veterans in your life and acknowledge their contributions to the freedoms that we enjoy each and every day.

Veterans Day is a well-known American holiday, but there are a few misconceptions about this very special day. Here are some important facts that we should all take note of and remember,

- 1. Veterans Day does NOT have an apostrophe. A lot of people think it's "Veteran's Day" or Veterans' Day," but that would be incorrect. The holiday is not a day that belongs to one veteran or multiple veterans, which is what an apostrophe implies. It's a day for honoring all veterans.
- 2. Veterans Day is NOT the same as Memorial Day. Memorial Day is a day to remember those who gave their lives for our country, particularly in battle or from wounds they suffered in battle. Veterans Day honors all who have served the country in war or peace, dead or alive, although it is largely intended to thank living veterans for their service.
- 3. Veterans Day was originally called Armistice Day, commemorating the end of World War I. "The war to end all wars" officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919. However, the fighting had ended about seven months before when the Allies and Germany put into effect an armistice on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. Because of this, November 11, 1918 was considered the end of World War I and it became an official holiday, primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I. In 1954, after World War II and the Korean War, "Armistice" was changed to "Veterans" so that the day would honor American veterans of all wars. In 1968, Congress signed the Uniform Holiday Bill to ensure that a few federal holidays would be celebrated on Mondays. But, after much confusion over the date, it became pretty evident that most US citizens wanted to celebrate Veterans Day on November 11, since it was a matter of historic and patriotic significance. So, in 1975, President Gerald Ford signed the law, which returned the annual observance to its original date beginning in 1978.
- 4. Other countries celebrate Veterans Day too, but in their own ways. World War I was a multinational effort, so it makes sense that our allies also wanted to celebrate their veterans on November 11. The name of the day and the commemorations differ, of course. Canada and Australia both call November 11 "Remembrance Day." Canada's observance is similar to our own, except many of its citizens wear red poppy flowers to honor their war dead. In Australia, the day is more like our Memorial Day. Great Britain also calls it "Remembrance Day," but observes it on the Sunday closest to November 11 with parades, services and two minutes of silence in London to honor those who lost their lives in war.





# Did You Know...



...that a United Methodist lay person in the Philippines is developing an amphibious vehicle that can help with rescue and relief operations during the frequent floods that plague that country? Well, that is exactly what is happening!! Severe Weather Amphibious Navigator, or SWAN, is a research initiative by Ryan John de Lara, a member of United Methodist City Temple in Cabanatuan City.

This vehicle will be able to seamlessly move from land to water and back again. This will speed up rescue and relief operations, says De Lara; and as is generally the rule, the

lesser the time of response, the greater the chance of rescue and survival of flood/typhoon victims.

SWAN is a prototype of an amphibious navigator made of abaca fiber composites woven into fabrics. Molded with a fiberglass-reinforced composite hull, SWAN is lighter than steel and just as strong. The vehicle is a conversion of an existing truck, with the chassis and engine mounted to the newly formed hull to form the new vehicle. Using these natural fibers instead of synthetic makes it more environmentally friendly. The vehicle utilizes a single engine for both land and water travel.

The on-road, off-road capabilities of the vehicle will enhance disaster relief and response to flooding. It can carry up to twenty people and two hundred packs of relief goods.

Central Luzon is regularly devastated by typhoons and monsoon rains, which hit flood prone areas particularly hard. It then becomes especially difficult to transport relief goods. In transporting these relief goods it has been necessary to move the goods from truck to boat and

back to truck, which usually costs more time in response. The vehicle is now being praised as a valuable addition to the limited resources being utilized for disaster response in the Philippines. This is just another example of how the people of The United Methodist Church put their hands and hearts to work in showing the love of Christ to all of God's children.
