Thank You, Pastor Phil!!!



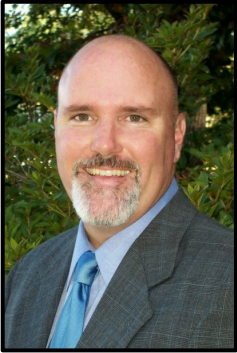
This month is sad, but thankfully not too sad!

FROM THE PASTOR'S

The High Priest of a New Covenant

Hebrews 8:1-13 (NIV)

8 Now the main point of what we are saying is this: We do have such a high priest, who sat down at the right hand of the throne of the Majesty in heaven, 2 and who serves in the sanctuary, the true tabernacle set up by the Lord, not by a mere human being.

3 Every high priest is appointed to offer both gifts and sacrifices, and so it was necessary for this one also to have something to offer. 4 If he were on earth, he would not be a priest, for there are already priests who offer the gifts prescribed by the law. 5 They serve at a sanctuary that is a copy and shadow of what is in heaven. This is why Moses was warned when he was about to build the tabernacle: "See to it that you make everything according to the pattern shown you on the mountain." [a] 6 But in fact the ministry Jesus has received is as superior to theirs as the covenant of which he is mediator is superior to the old one, since the new covenant is established on better promises.

7 For if there had been nothing wrong with that first covenant, no place would have been sought for another. 8 But God found fault with the people and said: "The days are coming, declares the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the people of Israel and with the people of Judah. 9 It will not be like the covenant I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to lead them out of Egypt, because they did not remain faithful to my covenant, and I turned away from them, declares the Lord. 10 This is the covenant I will establish with the people of Israel after that time, declares the Lord. I will put my laws in their minds and write them on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people.

11 No longer will they teach their neighbor, or say to one another, "Know the Lord," because they will all know me, from the least of them to the greatest. 12 For I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more." 13 By calling this covenant "new," he has made the first one obsolete; and what is obsolete and outdated will soon disappear.

Jesus is the perfect high priest. He lives forever so he will be our priest forever. His sacrifice is once and for all, and you will never need another sacrifice to be made on your behalf, and because Jesus lives forever, he forever intercedes for you — going before the Father on your behalf. In other words, he is your representative. He takes care of you, he stands up for you, he looks out for you.

Every time we start talking about God's extended mercy, there is always the person who asks, "Does that mean I can sin all I want, and God will always give me a second chance?" The way it works out is that you sin more than you want. That is because when you surrender your life to Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit comes into your life, you become a new creation, and God begins making changes in you. He begins the process of conforming you to the image of his Son.

This does not happen overnight. I don't know how long the process takes; I can only say that it takes longer than the 59 years that I have been alive. What you will discover is that you stumble a lot more than you want to. And what you will discover is that falling flat on your face or foolishly wandering off the path does not bring you nearly as much fulfillment as does walking in close connection with Christ.

When you make the decision to follow Christ, you inevitably discover that you sin more than you want to. You can become so frustrated with your own limitations that it will lead you to despair. At this point you need to remember the basis of God's new covenant: It is based on second chances.

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If your image of God has him staring you down with stern disapproval, arms folded, shaking his head and saying, "You again?" Then you are not approaching God based on the new covenant. The new covenant says, "My people failed in the past, but I will not give up on them. I'll give them another chance." Now, this is not about thumbing your nose at God's mercy. It is about living in the security of his love and acceptance. When you fall-down, he wants you to try again. When you wander away, he wants you to come back. This is the basis of the new covenant.

Jesus Christ came into this world, lived a perfect life, and died on the cross for our sins — so that we could enjoy this new covenant with God. It is a covenant based on second chances. It is a covenant based on a personal relationship. It is a covenant based on the blank slate of God's absolute forgiveness. This kind of covenant is not as much like a covenant as it is like a will. It is your inheritance. It's what God is offering to you at this moment. Whether you are brand new to the faith or whether you've been a Christian for years, I invite you to receive your inheritance today.

It is definitely a recipe with a patriotic flair, but is so light and refreshing that we think it would be a hit anytime between now and the onset of cooler weather. **Patriotic Trifle** would be welcomed at any gathering of friends and family and would certainly be impressive with its colors, contents, and ease of preparation. But, it would also appeal to the kiddos in your life because of the jello and whipped topping!!! It makes a pretty big bowl of lusciousness...so be sure to send out a couple of invites when you whip it up! This one is just fun...so have fun making it and enjoying it!!!



Patriotic Trifle

- 1 (3 ounce) package berry blue jello
- 1 (3 ounce) package strawberry jello
- 2 cups boiling water
- 1 cup cold water
- 2 cups cold milk
- 2 (3.4 ounce) packages of instant vanilla pudding mix
- 1 (16 ounce) carton frozen whipped topping, thawed and divided
- 1 pint fresh blueberries
- 1 quart fresh strawberries, quartered
- 1 whole prepared angel food cake (8-10 ounces) cut into 1 inch cubes

In two small bowls, combine each jello flavor with 1 cup boiling water. Stir $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cold water into each. Pour each into an ungreased 9 inch square pan. Refrigerate for about an hour or until set. Meanwhile, in a large bowl, whisk milk and pudding mixes for 2 minutes. Let stand for 2 minutes or until soft-set. Fold in 2 cups of the whipped topping. Set aside $\frac{1}{4}$ cup blueberries and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup strawberries for garnish. Cut the jello into 1 inch cubes. In a 3 quart trifle bowl or serving dish, layer the strawberry jello, half of the cake cubes, the remaining blueberries and half of the pudding mixture. Top with the blue jello and remaining cake cubes, remaining strawberries, and remaining pudding mixture. Garnish with reserved berries and remaining whipped topping. Serve immediately and enjoy!!!

What is a brief history of Lay Servant Ministries...?

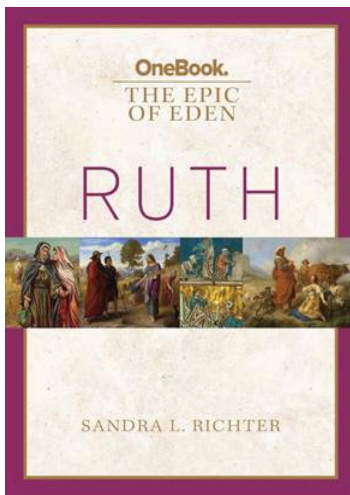

Recommended Reading

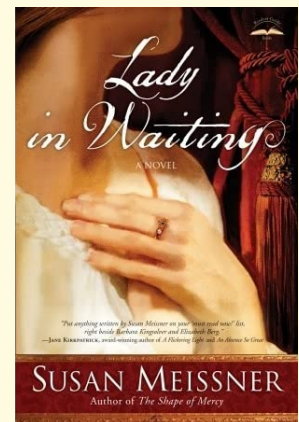


More than likely many of us have spent some extra hours over the past couple of months reading. It just might be that you have reconnected with your love of reading. Whether you are looking for a good beach read for some much-anticipated time away, or you are simply spending time in the quiet of home, finding good books that interest us and inform us can be a challenge. This month, we would actually like to recommend two books by the same author. Susan Meissner has spent her entire life as a writer, having penned her first poem at the age of four. She has authored many novels and has received several awards for her work. When she's not writing, she serves as the director of small groups and connection ministries at her San Diego church. Susan and her pastor husband are the parents of four young adults.

The first title that we would like to recommend is [A Fall of Marigolds](#). In this enjoyable book, the lives of Clara Wood and Taryn Michaels are connected in a way that is so evident but yet so hard to believe. Clara serves in the medical facility on Ellis Island in 1911. While caring for a fevered immigrant whose recent loss resonates with her, she becomes intrigued by the name embroidered onto a scarf he carries. Fast forward to 2011, and we become immersed in Taryn's story. She thinks that she has her life in order and is living a complete and full life. Then, a long-lost photograph surfaces in a national magazine and she is forced to relive that awful day that her husband died in the collapse of the World Trade Towers...the same day that a stranger reached out and saved her. But, a chance reconnection and a century-old scarf begin to open Taryn's eyes to the larger forces at work in her life.

We would also like to recommend [Lady in Waiting](#) by the same author. In this interesting read we come to know Lady Jane Grey and her dressmaker Lucy Day. Set in the sixteenth century Jane Grey is an innocent young woman whose fate seems to be controlled by a dangerous political and religious climate. The times are a very real threat to Jane's true love and the pursuit of her own interests. Dove-tailed within this story, we get to know Jane Lindsay who lives and works in New York City. While working in her quaint antiques store she comes into possession of an old ring in a box of relics from a British jumble sale. The ring contains a Latin inscription, but also one word in English...Jane. Feeling an instant connection to this mysterious ring bearing her very own name, Jane begins a journey to learn more about the ring and perhaps even about herself.

As is evidenced by this bit of information, both of these books weave together historical fiction and current day events, characters, and settings. So, if you enjoy a bit of learning, a well-written story, a book without foul language and offensive content, and an escape from the day-to-day grind, then these two books would be just the ticket!
