Song Of Solomon 2:8 to 13 The voice of my beloved! Behold he comes leaping upon the mountains, skipping upon the hills. My beloved is like a gazelle or a young stag. Behold, he stands behind our wall; he is looking through the windows, gazing through the lattice.

My beloved spoke, and said to me: "Rise up, my love, my fair one, and come away. For the winter is past, the rain is over and gone. The flowers appear on the earth; the time of singing has come, and the voice of the turtle dove is heard in our land. The fig tree puts forth her green figs, and the vines with tender grapes give a good smell. Rise up, my love, my fair one, and come away!

Oh, the time of youth when love was in the air! Can you remember those times? You were strong in body and mind, and your beloved was beautiful and set your mind ablaze? You rode by her house a thousand times hoping to get a glance of her? But you had to get past her father! Riding around together in your automobile, drive-in restaurants, sock hops, or maybe skating rinks and swimming pools? She thought you were the best and you just knew she was the one for you!

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Then, as time passed, work became a chore and took a lot of your time. Babies came along, Mom had to go to work just to help feed the family! Each bitter word is like adding another feather to the load! It does not weigh much, but they build up until the load becomes too heavy to carry! When that happens, communications cease and the relationship becomes broken! It is time to swallow your pride and to humble yourself! Confess your sins to each other and renew your commitments to each other! Do not take each other for



granted! Court each other again! Spend time together! The test of a loving relationship is not when you are young, strong and beautiful, but when you are both 80, walking with canes or pushing one in a wheelchair, when your hair is white, or gone and maybe even your teeth! The Recipe Box

Many of us make resolutions for the new year and many times at least one of those resolutions will center on our health and wellness...possibly the foods we eat. Although we did not publish in January, we thought we might give you a relatively healthy recipe idea to help you along with your goals. This recipe comes to us from Ree Drummond, otherwise known as The Pioneer Woman. Sometimes we might struggle to incorporate a variety of vegetables in our cooking, but this is a hearty dish, full of great vegetables, which can be accompanied by a salad to round out the meal. Because this recipe has an extensive ingredient list and a couple of steps to its preparation, you might be somewhat intimidated. But don't be! Give this recipe a try! It makes a casserole dish full so you might want to make it with the intention of sharing it with family or friends!

Veggie-Packed Pasta

Kosher salt, to taste
12 ounces whole wheat penne pasta
3 tablespoons olive oil, divided
1 yellow onion, thinly sliced
3 cloves garlic, minced
1 bunch asparagus, cut into bite-size pieces
1 medium zucchini, cut into bite-size chunks
Black pepper, to taste
½ cup white wine

2 cups torn fresh kale
1 cup frozen peas
½ cup ricotta cheese
½ cup prepared pesto
1 cup seasoned breadcrumbs
¼ cup grated Parmesan
½ teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
Fresh parsley leaves, for serving

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Preheat the oven to 425 degrees. Cook the pasta until al dente, according to package directions. Drain, reserving ¼ cup of the pasta water (plus a little more). Set the pasta and pasta water aside. Heat 2 tablespoons of the olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. When the oil is hot, add the onion and garlic and stir. Add the asparagus and zucchini and sprinkle with a good pinch of salt and pepper. Cook, stirring, to soften the vegetables, 2 to 3 minutes. Add the white wine, scrape up the bottom of the pan and let the wine cook down. Add the kale, peas, ricotta cheese, pesto and the reserved ¼ cup pasta water and bring to a boil, cook for 1 minute. Add the drained pasta and mix thoroughly. Use more pasta water as needed if the mixture



is too thick. Transfer the pasta mixture to a 9 x 13-inch baking dish. In a medium bowl, add the breadcrumbs, Parmesan, crushed red pepper flakes and remaining 1 tablespoon of olive oil. Mix until combined. Sprinkle the breadcrumb mixture over top of the pasta, then bake until the breadcrumbs are golden, and the pasta is bubbly, about 15-17 minutes. Remove from the oven and garnish with the fresh parsley. Serve, enjoy, and appreciate the fact that you have fueled your body with an awesome mixture of good-for-you vegetables!!!


Recommended Reading



The written word can have a great influence in our lives. We have all read books that have had a great impact upon us and have imparted a much needed perspective to our lives. This month, we would like to recommend a relatively small volume to you...but one that is sure to loom large in your thoughts upon reading it. The Noticer, by Andy Andrews, is a New York Times bestseller and is based on the true story of "Jones," a remarkable and mysterious drifter who has a knack for showing up in people's lives at just the right time. Through his gentle ways he provides timeless lessons about love, life, and just how very important perspective is as we navigate the life we have been given.

This endearing allegory is set in the town of Orange Beach, Alabama...a simple town of simple people. But, just like all of us, the people of Orange Beach have their fair share of problems – marriages headed for divorce, young people losing hope and giving up on life, business owners on the verge of bankruptcy, and other obstacles that just seem to be a part of life. To the good people of this small town, these situations seem to be dead ends. But, to Jones, who has a gift for seeing what others miss, there is no such thing as a dead end. Jones contends that it only takes a little perspective to recognize the miracles in our moments and the seeds of greatness that are divinely tucked into our struggles.

Jones has a "knack" for showing up just when things seem their darkest...to a young man living beneath a pier, to someone struggling to define happiness...let alone experience it, to a business owner whose business practices border on the illegal, to the widowed woman who believes that her life has no meaning or purpose, and even to a group of young friends who simply want to know how to avoid some of the common heartaches which adults inevitably seem to encounter. To these characters, and others, Jones shows up when he is needed most, with nothing more than his battered old suitcase and his love.



<u>The Noticer</u> beautifully blends fiction and allegory in this entertaining and inspiring book. It challenges the reader to a better way of living...a better life. As you read through the pages of this little volume, you will no doubt see much of your own life, or the lives of those around you. You will also see a remarkable representation of the presence of Christ in our lives...always showing up, always guiding, always encouraging, and always wanting the very best for us! We do hope that you will want to read <u>The Noticer</u>. It is now available in The Lending Library here at Pleasant Grove and is also available through the public library, on-line booksellers, and bookstores everywhere.

As a way of encouraging you to invest a few hours in this book, here are a couple of quotes from Jones:

"Remember, whatever you focus upon, increases."

"Most people think it takes a long time to change. It doesn't. Change is immediate! Instantaneous! It may take a long time to decide to change...but change happens in a heartbeat!"

"Move into the light."




After-School Care Post

We want to extend a very special thank you to the church members who cleared our parking lot. This act of love and caring allowed us to get back to the business of serving our families in a timely manner. As of this printing, we have an enrollment of 18 students from 14 different families. These families rely on our ministry, and we are glad to be used by God in this way.









Did You Know???



...that we aren't the only United Methodist Church reaching out to our homeless neighbors with the love of Christ? Of course, you did! But we thought we would highlight two other UM congregations who are stepping up to help in a new and different way.

On Saturday, January 15th, two Louisville, Kentucky churches teamed up to hand out about seventy backpack kits to the homeless. These kits had been assembled by Kentucky Annual Conference staff as a Christmas-season service project. The two churches, Fourth Avenue UMC and St. Paul UMC, also had about three dozen blankets for distribution. These much-needed items were given out as part of Fourth

Avenue's Open Door Ministry and St. Paul's Resource Center, which have teamed up as ministry partners during the Covid-19 pandemic. The kits included socks and gloves, hand-warmers and winter hats, toothbrushes and toothpaste, small first aid kits, wipes, hand sanitizer, and face masks.

Before the pandemic, St. Paul offered a weekly Resource Center, providing a hot meal, clothing, showers, bus tickets, and other essentials. When the pandemic hit, they were forced to cease that offering. The actual event had to come to a halt, but the generosity of their congregation continued to exist and even flourish. In response to this generosity and the trying times, the church decided to pivot and take the ministry on the road. In June of 2021, Fourth Avenue set up a monthly event on the sidewalk at the church. This well-received regular event occurred out-of-doors until December, when the weather necessitated moving indoors.



Open Door began in 1990 with a focus on nutrition and healthcare. It goes well with Fourth Avenue's mission of "sharing the love of God in the heart of

the city." When you combine these two ministries with the efforts of the Annual Conference Staff on mission, you get a beautiful outcome...blankets in the hands of those who are cold, food in the bellies of the hungry, hygiene items for those living without such creature comforts, and warm clothing on the bodies of those who are cold.



During February, as you pack a "Fresh Start Kit" for Roof Above right here in Charlotte, please remember to pray for the individual who will receive your kit. But also remember to pray for the homeless in Louisville, Kentucky and across our nation as United Methodist congregations reach out to them with love and compassion.

Then, pray for the person who will be receiving your box. You can pack one of these kits for around \$25. It might be fun to shop together with your family for the kit. Or you could team up with a friend or neighbor to accomplish this. A Sunday school class could pack several together. We just want to impact as many lives as we can with the love of Christ. Thanks for being the hands of feet of Jesus in a world that needs to see Him at work! God has so abundantly blessed us...we can't help but pass those blessings on to others!!!




